#### PASTORAL PERSPECTIVE

Greetings to you!

While I have not spent much time within the walls of Saint Paul, your congregation and pastors have already made a significant impact on my life and ministry and I look forward to "coming home" to #DoGood with you in Benson, in Omaha, and beyond. I remember meeting your lay members to annual conference over the years, reading your church newsletter when I served as Executive Director of United Methodist Ministries, and working with Saintt Paul volunteers in Big Garden sites and at the Blue Flamingo and noting your commitment to mission and justice work. When I came to meet with your SPRC, I found the photos of many friends smiling at me from the wall of pastors outside the church office. I am eager to learn more about both the history and the current ministries of this congregation so we can together chart our course into the future.

As a kid, I always liked to have a map with me in the back seat of the car when our family went on vacations. I am confident no one in the front seat needed my advice regarding route selection, but I do remember being fascinated by the key in the corner of the map and the accompanying symbols that were listed in an organized manner in that little box and then flung across the map itself. Perhaps there were trees to mark state or national parks, tiny houses to mark rest stops, and all manner of jagged or dashed lines to depict roadway variants. Sometimes there were additional maps to be gathered, such as maps just for the location of wildflowers or public highway art or farmers markets. I learned that there can be more than one official map and sometimes it worked best to consult three or four at the same time to really understand what I was seeing out the window and what might be ahead.

I think churches are like that collection of maps. While there are facts and figures that are available to help describe a congregation, each member and visitor also has their own map – stories of favorite moments, people who have touched their lives, ministries that made a deep impression, worship services and traditions that have both helped people grow over time and have led to specific insights or offered comfort in times of distress. Each person also has their own item from the map's key they find most interesting: mission trips, storage closets, community partners – there are many maps.

I look forward to learning more from you, the storytellers and map-makers of Saint Paul, so that together we can look towards the future from a place of wisdom and preparation and move forward in faith.

# A Sustainable Future for Saint Paul: Ministry Budget Info!

#### **Great Plains Annual Conference**

Fourteen hundred plus clergy and laity gathered in Topeka, Kansas for the 2019 Great Plains Annual Conference from May 29 through June 1. Seeing so many fellow United Methodists all gathered together and praising God was so uplifting – Bishop Saenz' message about working together to assure that all God's children were made to feel welcome and respected in our denomination set the tone for the rest of the conference. As always, the music was phenomenal that evening and at all the gatherings. The main focus was on the importance of selecting clergy and laity delegates to the 2020 General Conference and Jurisdictional Conference. It took several ballots over the 3 days, but finally 7 clergy and 7 laity delegates were elected to the general conference, and the same number were elected for the jurisdictional conference, as well as alternates for each. Our own Stephanie Ahlschwede was selected as delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Thursday began at 7a.m. with the Missouri River district breakfast and updates by our District Superintendent, Chad Anglemyer. We reviewed the budget, appointments and did an exercise of needs and plans led by Rev. Debra McKnight. This was followed by the laity session reviewing the conference agenda, resolutions and petitions requiring a vote, and reports.

On Friday, Mike Mather of Broadway UMC in Indianapolis gave an inspirational talk about finding others' talents, gifts, power, and capabilities and finding a way to use them while empowering the individuals. He reminded us to practice hospitality and treat each other as family.

Reports are verbally received from all Great Plains committees, institutions and services. The budget an financial standing are important considerations and must be approved by the body. Pension and health plans for our ministers and staff are reviewed, changed via resolutions, motions or amendments. Our conference treasurer is frequently called upon to answer questions or give feedback.

We took care of the general conference business, and voted on resolutions submitted to the delegation. There were 16 resolutions and one petition presented this year. Nine of these were church closings.

The most important resolutions, we felt, were those that affirmed the position guaranteeing the same rights and privileges for all people in the United Methodist Church regardless of color, race, gender, sexual orientation, and class, and stated that the Great Plains Conference would resist the implementation of the traditional plan that was approved by the 2019 Special Session – both resolutions were passed overwhelmingly. Another resolution that was passed affirmed our conference's commitment to being good stewards of the earth's resources and our environment.

Next year's conference will again be in Topeka and in Grand Island the following year.




