Numbers! What good does it do to keep a record of attendance, giving, outreach and benevolent giving? Well, numbers can help us paint a self-portrait. Every Tuesday I enter into the Vital Signs report in the computer our "numbers." These numbers help us to see how we are doing in our efforts to "be the church." Here is a summary of our numbers for 1/1/15 to 9/14/15.

As you look at the numbers you can see what our average worship attendance is, and how many individuals participate in the small groups here at Saint Paul, and are involved in outreach ministry. The Benevolent and Charitable giving is the amount we give to Mission Shares and other ministries beyond our walls. And the offering is what we give to support the work and ministry of Saint Paul U. M.C. This is a portrait of a vital church. But our portraits can show us some areas where we need to "touch up" the portrait. For example our average giving (# 6 & 7 above) is \$10,960 and we need \$13,116. This portrait shows us an area that needs our attention.

The weekend of October 24 & 25, we are being asked by our Stewardship and Finance Committee to prayerfully consider our financial commitment for 2016. We are a vital congregation with numerous ministries that touch the lives of thousand's every year! We have a history as a community oriented congregation, with a strong outreach to children with our childcare and preschool. We have helped organize and support the Benson Area Refugee Task Force, and work with other churches and organizations of our community. We have an alive Sunday School for all ages, and a vibrant youth program. The music ministry touches our souls and reaches out to the community. We have a bright future! God is calling us into avenues of ministry that are exciting!

And also, we should remember that the poor are always with us and in need of our "tiny" or large gestures to "make the world better." To help them is to help Christ himself. Your pastor can tell you how you can serve in a meaningful way.

### Necessity of Sharing


ver a thousand years ago, a saintly Christian made the following comment:

"If a man were given all the material things of the world, all the cattle, lands, lakes, he would be unhappy unless he could share them with someone he loved." St. Aelred

When one thinks about sharing seriously, the likelihood is that one will come to understand that sharing is an absolute necessity. Especially if we are to have good spiritual and mental health. God has made us to give, to share. It is part of loving. It is part of what brings inner joy. It is surely one of the reasons that Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35). Some of those who have not had previous experience of Christian stewardship may think that it is a financial whip-round; that a target is announced; that the familiar fund-raising thermometer appears outside the church and that when the target has been reached the whole project is dismantled, along with the thermometer, and that they are left in peace until the next financial crisis

arises.

Now that type of purely fund-raising activity has its place. Everyone likes a good fete. But these things should not be confused with Christian stewardship, which is something much, much deeper. It is about every department of a Christian life. It is about our need first to respond with thanks to God for all his blessings and then to offer God through Jesus Christ our souls and bodies to be a living sacrifice.

Someone once said there are two ways of looking at life: you can take it for granted or you can take it with gratitude and the choice you make determines your character.

Think of the good things that God has given you and your family; the relative freedom and luxury we enjoy in our country. Giving thanks for what God has given us in life and for what God

### October is Breast Cancer Month

Breast Cancer is the most diagnosed cancer amongst women, affecting one of every 8 women in the US. The disease can also affect men which is about 2% of the male population. Early detection is very important.

In the past several years there has been a lot of confusion about getting mammograms for early detection. Mammograms do not find every cancer, especially if small or occurring on the outer side of the breasts. Mammograms are still recommended every year for woman 40 years or older or younger if there is a history of breast cancer in the family.

The most common symptom of breast cancer is feeling a lump in the breasts. This is why it is so important to do monthly breast palpitations around the time of the menstrual cycle or if the woman has gone through menopause, the palpating for lumps should be scheduled a specific date every month, like on your birthday. Other possible symptoms of breast cancer include swelling of all or part of a breast, skin irritation or dimpling, breast or nipple pain;, nipple retraction (turning inward), redness, scaliness, or thickening of the nipple, and nipple discharge.

Most of these symptoms occur after the breast cancer has spread within the breast. If the breast cancer has spread to the lymph nodes, swelling and pain can occur. Swollen lymph nodes should always be reported to your physician. This is why early detection is so important. Women are now being so aware of their breasts that early detection is occurring, which results in early treatment and better outcomes. Women are living much longer with breast cancer. The American Cancer Society has a lot of materials on breast cancer; search cancer.org.
