

Basic Lay Servant Training

God calls every Christian to a life of servanthood as a disciple of Jesus Christ. A Basic Lay Servant Training course will be held at Bellevue Aldersgate UMC, 3617 Greene Ave., Bellevue, on Friday, May 2, from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. and Saturday, May 3, from 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The registration deadline for this course is Friday, April 25.

In the Lay Servant Ministries Basic Course, Sandy and Brian Jackson discuss processes to help individuals discern and respond to God's particular call on their lives. They encourage each person to recognize and employ his or her spiritual gifts for the church to become what God intended it to be. This course invites participants to consider the importance of exercising servant leadership, developing future leaders, remaining rooted in consistent spiritual practices, and being part of a group that holds members accountable in discipleship. It offers guidelines for optimal communication in leadership and presents numerous types of ministries in which lay servants may assume roles. Throughout the study, thoughtful questions provide excellent opportunities for individual consideration and group discussion.

Holy Week Begins

Palm Sunday, April 13: To the faithful Jew, a mecca to Jerusalem to celebrate Passover in the Temple was the epitome of worship. Jesus knew this and went himself to proclaim God's kingdom being at hand. We remember the excitement of the crowd with brass at 8:15/11:05 and waving palms at all services. David Schack serves as guest organist at 11:05.

Seder Wednesday, April 16: The Seder is one part of the present-day Jewish seven day Passover (Pesach) celebration. The name Passover harks back to the time when God, through Moses, led the Israelites out of their slavery in Egypt. Christians are particularly interested in the ritual Seder meal because it was during a Passover celebration that Jesus instituted Holy Communion. Join in this moving observance for the whole family at 6:00 p.m. in Fellowship Hall. Please RSVP to the church office for the dinner, which will include beef stew, rolls, and dessert.

Maundy Thursday, April 17: Holy Thursday is the Christian reenactment of the Passover feast that Jesus himself celebrated with the Twelve Disciples the eve of his arrest. As part of our Holy Communion celebration, we will observe a ritual of hand washing, following Christ's command to, "do this in remembrance of me." The Joy Bell Ringers will offer special music during this service which begins @ 7 p.m. in the Sanctuary.

Good Friday, April 18: For Protestants the observance of Good Friday is a most somber and solemn occasion. This powerful retelling of Christ's last hours will begin @ 7 p.m. in the Sanctuary. Our worship will center round the power of the cross as we hear the words of Christ's lament against his faithless church. David Schack will serve as guest organist.

Prayer Vigil, April 18-19: This time of holy waiting symbolizes the Church waiting at the Lord's tomb in prayer and fasting, meditating on his Passion and Death and on his Descent into Hell, and awaiting his Resurrection. The vigil, held in Roth Chapel, runs from the conclusion of Good Friday's service until the beginning of the Holy Saturday service (8 p.m. until 4 p.m.) We ask that you sign up for the vigil on the board located in the gathering area.

Holy Saturday, April 19: We begin our time of worship with a reminder that Christ has not yet risen through the last of the first person visitations that tell the story of God's people awaiting the Messiah. The sacrament of Holy Communion offers us the chance to start anew in God's love for us as Christ's resurrection is announced. The service will begin at 5:00 p.m. in Roth Chapel.

Easter Day, April 20: Easter Sunday is the main reason why Christians keep Sunday, the first day of the week, as the primary day of religious observance. Easter serves as the great feast day and pinnacle of the Christian liturgical year. It is also the first day of the new season of the Great Fifty Days, or [Eastertide](#), which runs from Easter Sunday to [Pentecost](#) Sunday. Our celebration of the resurrection will include communion observances at 6:30, 8:15, 9:35 & 11:05 a.m. Bring your family and friends to worship at St. Paul. An extended organ prelude time at 11:05 by David Schack, guest organist.

Confirmation Sunday, April 27: Join with the Family of God as we receive the newest members to St. Paul Church. The confirmands have been preparing throughout the Lenten season for this Christian ritual. As part of the service we welcome the Kol Rina Choir from Temple Israel and Cantor Wendy Shermet together with singers from the Chancel and Folk Gospel Choirs during the 11:05 worship hour. One of the experiences of the confirmation students was their participation in a festive Shabbat evening service at the Temple on March 07. The combined choirs will offer their special music during Shabbat evening worship on Friday, May 02 at 6:00 p.m. at the new facility located off of 132nd Street, just south of Pacific, in Sterling Ridge.

A New Refugee Family?

The Saint Paul Mission Team has begun the process of study toward the resettlement of a refugee family sometime during 2014. As part of the new business of the March 31 Church Council meeting, Lacey Studnicka of Lutheran Family Services will present a brief synopsis of the refugee resettlement process in Omaha and how that process is changing to meet the needs of an ever expanding community. Working with LFS the Missions and Social Justice Teams will be in dialog with others in the church in the upcoming months about how we might best approach the possibility of offering our support.

Refugee Clothes Closet

The Benson Area Refugee Taskforce will be hosting their first refugee clothes closet of 2014 on Saturday, April 26 from 9:00 – 10:00 a.m. at Immanuel Lutheran Church, just south of 60th Avenue & Maple. The refugee families in the area will be invited to “shop” (all of the clothes are free) for much needed clothing items. Many of our refugee brothers and sisters come to the United States with only the clothes they are wearing.

Your gifts of men’s small – medium sizes and all sizes of children’s clean and gently used clothing and shoes are so very much appreciated. No women’s clothes are needed at this time. As always, packages of socks and underwear are a staple of the event. The BART volunteers ask that clothing be dropped off at Immanuel Church on Thursday, April 24 between the hours of noon and 5:00 p.m.

The Worship Team will be serving dinner at the Siena/Francis House on Tuesday, April 1, and you are invited to join them. Please let the church office know if you can serve from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m.

Imagine the learning curve coming from a dirt floor refugee camp to living quarters where rooms are carpeted!

Colorectal Cancer Awareness

Did you know colorectal cancer is one of the five most common cancers in our country? Did you also know it is one of the leading causes of cancer deaths in the US? Another eye opening fact we bet you didn't know—90% of all colorectal cancers are found in people 50 years of age and older. Along with these bits of not so positive info, here's a good statistic! Colorectal cancer is very often highly treatable if found and treated early. The five-year survival rate is 90% in these cases! Sooo...what should you do?!?!?

If you're over the age of 50, run—don't walk—run to your friendly gastroenterologist and schedule your screening colonoscopy! They've really made improvements in the ole prep for this life-saving test. Don't be afraid! Be brave!

Here are a few symptoms of colorectal cancer—blood in the stool (that's a bowel movement, not the toilet!); stomach pain, aches or cramps that don't go away; losing weight and you don't know why. If you have any/all of these symptoms, again—run to that friendly gastroenterologist and get checked out!!

Some folks are at higher risk than others for developing colorectal cancer. The presence of any of these may increase your risk—inflammatory bowel disease, person or family history of colorectal polyps or colorectal cancer, some genetic syndromes.
