



We are half way through 2014! It is time to make an assessment of how we are doing financially. Our stewardship and finance committee has been keeping a close eye on our "finance health" and they are concerned.

Our giving is not keeping pace with the expenses. Our Saint Paul Foundation has given us a helping hand already and we are thankful! The 2014 budget was actually less than our 2013 budget. Our mission share for this year was drastically reduced because of the new conference formula. We also reduced the amount we pay for some of our staff. And the good news is that the child care and preschool are running in the black! So why the short fall? Many of the "fixed" expenses in our budget have risen – in other words it is costing more to keep the basics paid (utilities, insurances, supplies, etc.)

How can we be accomplishing some of the upkeep of our building? These are paid from gifts and investments that are outside of our income for the budget. When we repair the building, or replace a window these are paid from money we have invested with our Saint Paul Foundation and cannot be used for general budget expenses. Keeping the building in repair, paying our staff, paying our utilities, insurances, supplies, etc. is a complicated process. BUT – at heart of all of this is a simple answer -- WE are responsible for the financial support needed to keep the ministries of Saint Paul going. Saint Paul U.M.C. needs your financial support. Please give prayerful consideration of your giving. Is there a ministry you would consider supporting?

In July we will have a "giving tree" up in the gathering area. On this tree will be "leaves" listing various giving opportunities that you can pick from the tree. Much like our angel tree, the difference being the gifts are for Saint Paul! We need these gifts in order to keep the vital ministries going. So, be prepared to pick a leaf in July!!

It was an excellent conference and we got our work done. We hope this increases our ability to be God's co-workers here on planet Earth by working together in unity and love.



An important element in the receiving of Christ's holy meal is how we respond to the invitation. Through our monthly communal offering we respond to being the body of Christ in a truly tangible way. On **July 05/06** our second mile giving will help support the Great Plains Annual Conference special offering for the **Nebraska Clergy Retiree Health Assessment**. The sacramental observance on this weekend reminds us the commandment to "love one another" is made all the more meaningful as we participate in ministries that actively promote Christ's loving model of caring.

The Nebraska Retiree Health Care Team serves the Great Plains Annual Conference in overseeing the health insurance subsidy of Nebraska clergy retirees. The current subsidy was established for clergy who served in the Nebraska Annual Conference on or before December 31, 2013 and who have or will retire by December 31, 2019. The subsidy is part of the tradition of Nebraska churches to honor and support those that have served in the past as members of the former Nebraska Annual Conference. The team recommends that the funding request for 2014 be 1.25% of church income as approved in the Plan of Organization for the newly formed Great Plains Annual Conference. For Saint Paul Church that recommendation would translate to approximately \$3500.

New Refugee Family

The Saint Paul Mercy & Justice Team continue to prepare for the receiving of a new refugee family, at this time scheduled for late July. We are seeking the help of the congregation in securing furnishings and household items to make a livable first home in their new country. Thank you to everyone who brought items to the Midwest Mission Distribution Center (MMDC) United Methodist Committee On Relief (UMCOR) semi during the 2014 Annual Conference Session.

I would especially like to thank Mary Ann Bede and conference staff member Destiny Kucera. Mary Ann helped organize volunteers. Destiny did a great job arranging for the semi's transmission to be repaired. A heartfelt thank you to truck owner Charlie West who donates his time and expenses.

As of June 13, 2014, 456 churches brought items and/or money. A total of \$12,733.75 was received in cash donations and approximately nine tons of items were collected. Items donated included: 973 health kits, 2,480 school kits, 320 cleaning buckets (flood buckets), 204 sewing kits, 78 layette kits, 38 boxes of homemade cloth diapers, boxes and boxes of miscellaneous items, 16 treadle sewing machines (to be refurbished at the MMDC repair store), five wheelchairs, 18 bicycles, 500 quilts, eight boxes of new pillows and 10 tornado relief kits. ^s

Animals Are Good For Your Health

Health researchers are finally confirming that animals are good for your health. Just 10 minutes of physical interaction with an animal can lower blood pressure and increase warmth in your fingers, which are signs of relaxation. Studies have shown that young children who feared going to the dentist, had less stress and demonstrated less fear when a dog was present in the dentist's office, which the child could hug or pet.

Much research has been done with pet therapy and people with Alzheimer's disease. The presence of pets has been shown to reduce agitated behavior and contributes to better social interaction for those in long term memory support facilities. The reduced agitation was especially noticeable in the late afternoon, when patients typically become more restless and disoriented. Some facilities now have an in-house dog or cat who lives there and is available to residents at all times.

The American Heart Association says that having a pet may reduce the risk for cardiovascular disease. Some studies have shown that depression and post-traumatic stress syndrome can be lessened with pets. Military personnel coming home from Afghanistan and Iraq are trying to bring home dogs they have bonded with overseas, because they have been such a psychological support to them during times of stress.

There are over 20,000 service dogs in America, who do a variety of things to help a disabled person. They guide the blind, alert people who are deaf, pull a wheelchair, alert a person when they are about to have a seizure, remind a person with a mental disorder or memory issue when it is time to take their medication, calm a person with post-traumatic stress disorder during a period of agitation or anxiety, and other specific tasks specific to the individual's disability. Service dogs are not technically pets, since they are trained to do specific tasks, but their presence is certainly comforting and beneficial.

Some of the health benefits of pet ownership which research supports include:
